One of the most significant achievements has been the development of a "Community Driven" Five Year Strategic Plan. In May of 2012, we contracted with the Center for Public Safety Excellence to help us develop this comprehensive plan. Its foundation, built with community and membership input, correlates with the Department's pillars of "Mission", "Values", and "Vision". The strategic planning process utilized multiple evaluation tools including a S.W.O.T (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats) analysis to identify any issues or potential service gaps. The completed Five Year Strategic Plan outlines six initiatives, each with related goals and objectives and all with the end result of focusing on improved service delivery to our community. We will be reporting on the progress of each of these initiatives quarterly at our regularly scheduled Board Meetings. The Strategic Plan is available for review on our website.

In closing, please join me in thanking the Administrative, Line and Volunteer Personnel that assisted in the preparation of this well organized, concise synopsis of 2012. I would also like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation for your continued support and investment in the future of the El Dorado Hills Fire Department and our community.

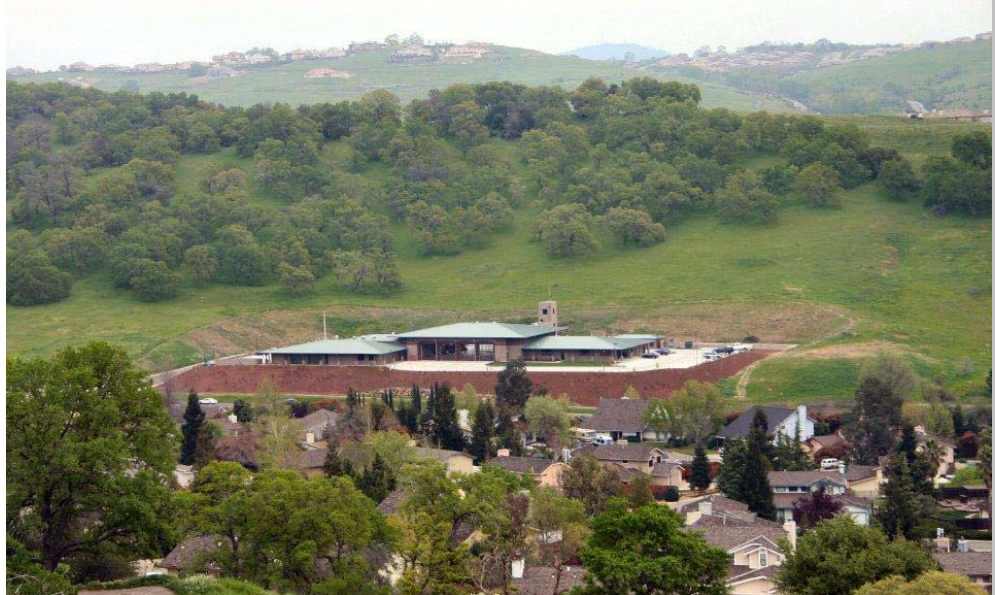

District Information



DISTRICT INFORMATION

Property Tax revenue and District assessed value continued to change with a very slight increase in 2012. Staffing decreased with a few more retirements in 2012. Highlights are as follows:

- Again this year, a Budget Committee, consisting of Board Members and Staff, reviewed all budget items prior to submittal to the Board. Staff worked together diligently to bring a balanced budget back to the Board for approval.
- Assessed value for the District increased 0.27% in 2012. The District Assessed Value has decreased an average of 1.88% per year over the past five years. The ten year average is an increase of 7.75% per year. The assessed value changes based on homes and commercial structures being reassessed and the recent foreclosures.
- Property tax revenue as projected by the County decreased 0.04% for the 2012/2013 fiscal year; however, this may vary based on supplemental tax revenue. Property tax revenue decreased an average of 0.65% per year over the past five years; however, over ten years it has increased an average of 8.5% per year. (These figures are distorted by the supplemental tax revenue which was also higher in previous years.)
- Commercial development is holding steady with the downturn in the economy with 20,885 in 2012. Year 2011 was 23,750 square feet of new commercial development which was up from 2008, 2009 and 2010. Over the past five years, the average increase has been 12,042 square feet per year.
- There is a little more than one percent increase in new home development in the District this past year. There is definitely more construction in 2011 and 2012 than in the prior two years. Homes constructed in 2012 were 152. The average number of homes over the past five years is 85 and over ten years is 407.
- Development fee revenue collected in 2012 was \$768,404 a substantial increase over last year. Residential home starts have declined dramatically over the past five years but the trend is up right now.

As you can see, the El Dorado Hills Fire District is growing at a very slow rate especially compared to years past. The Department remains proactive in meeting the ongoing challenges it faces to manage the growth and development needs in our community. Staff will continue to maintain control of the budget in these difficult economic times.

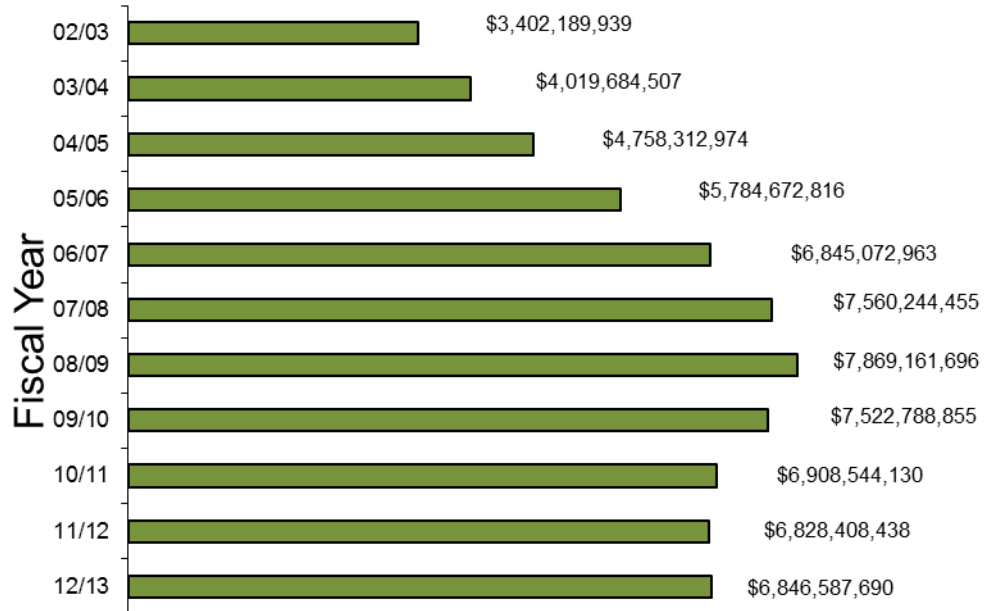

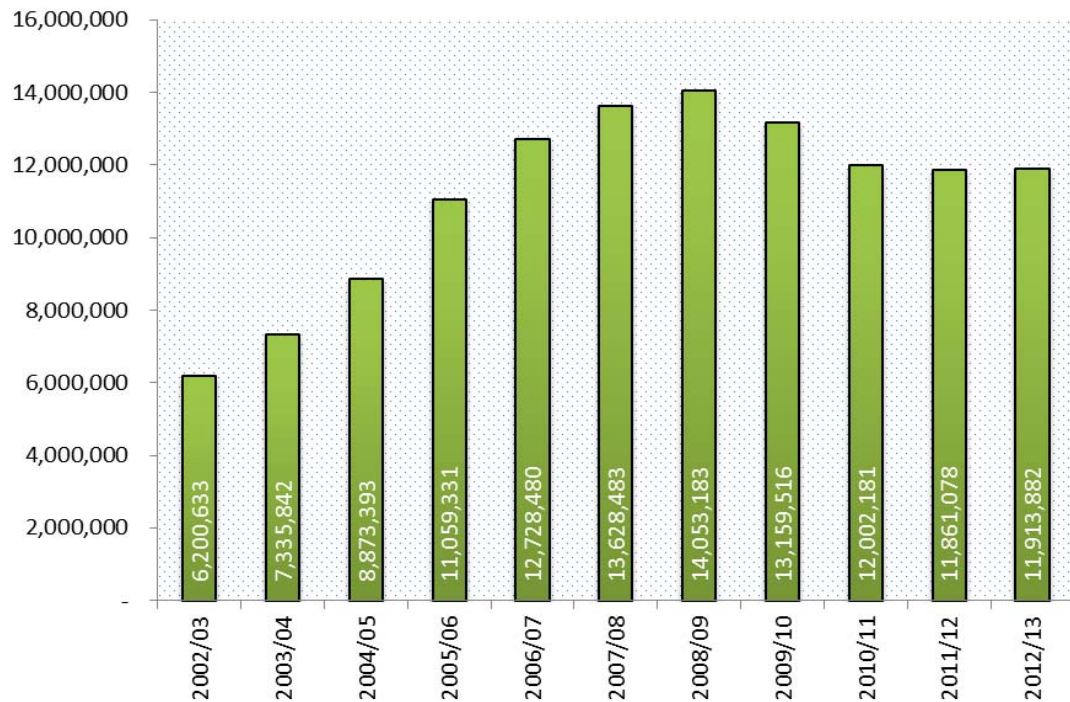

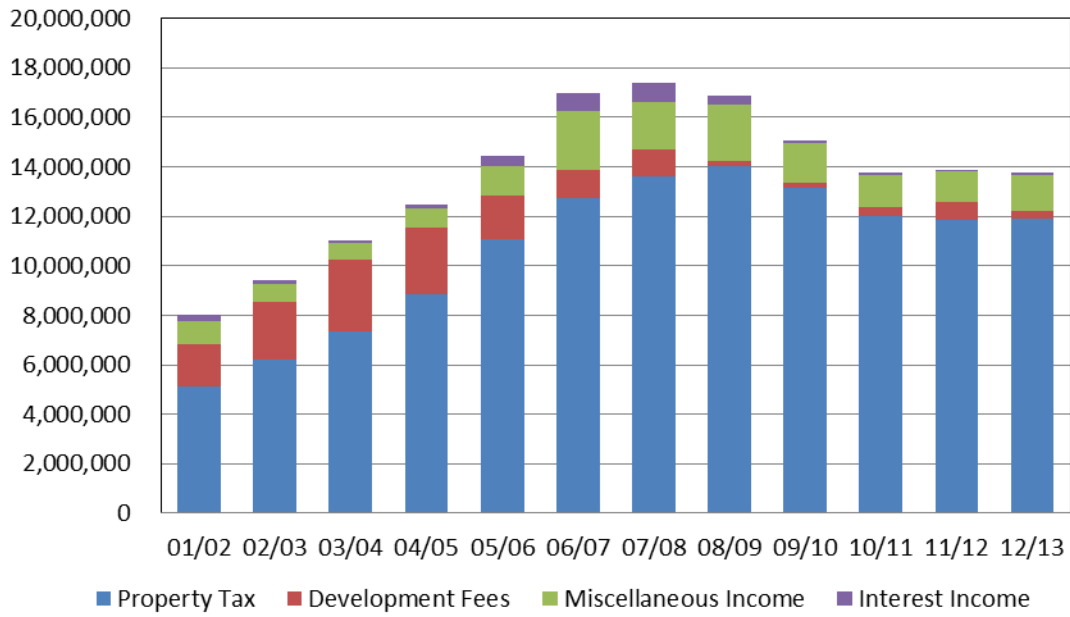
District Assessed Value



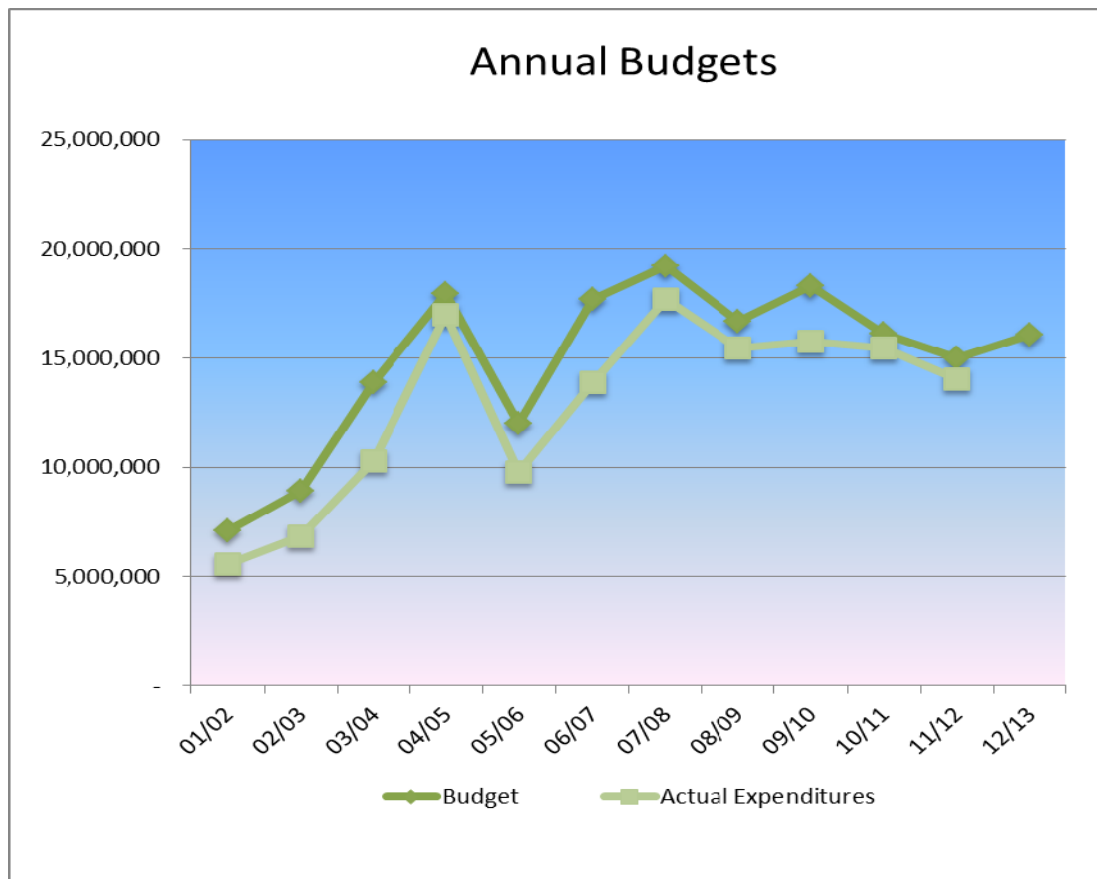
Property Tax Revenue



Annual Revenue

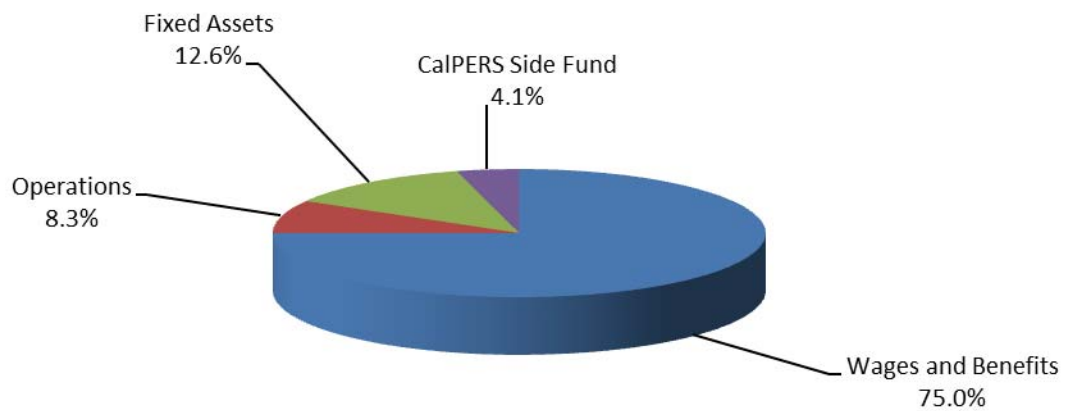


Annual Budgets

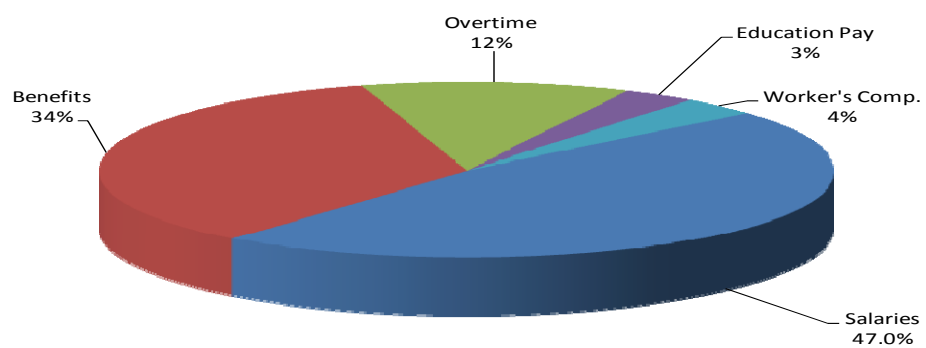


2012/2013 Budget Analysis (Total Budget - \$16,059,018)

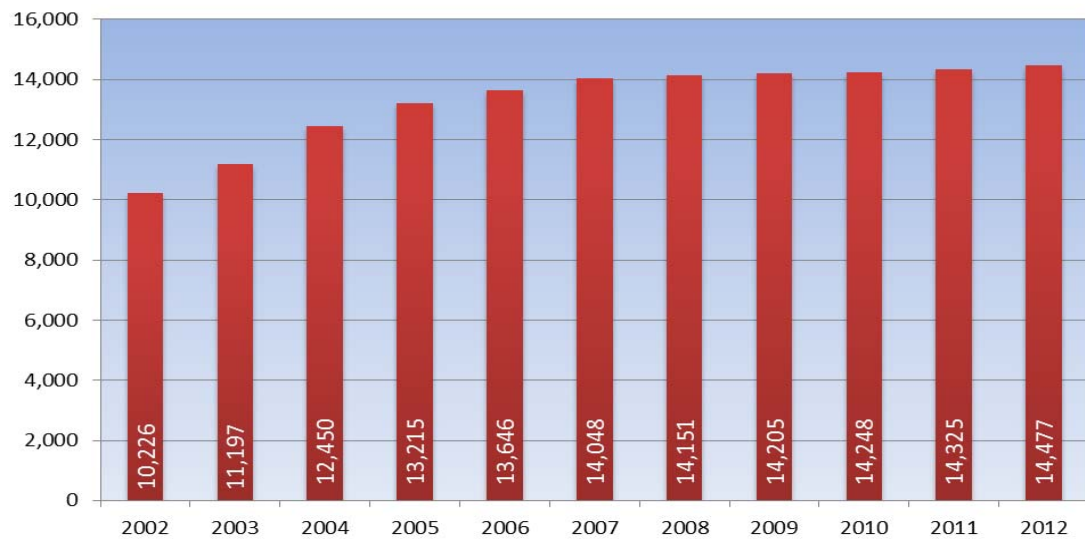

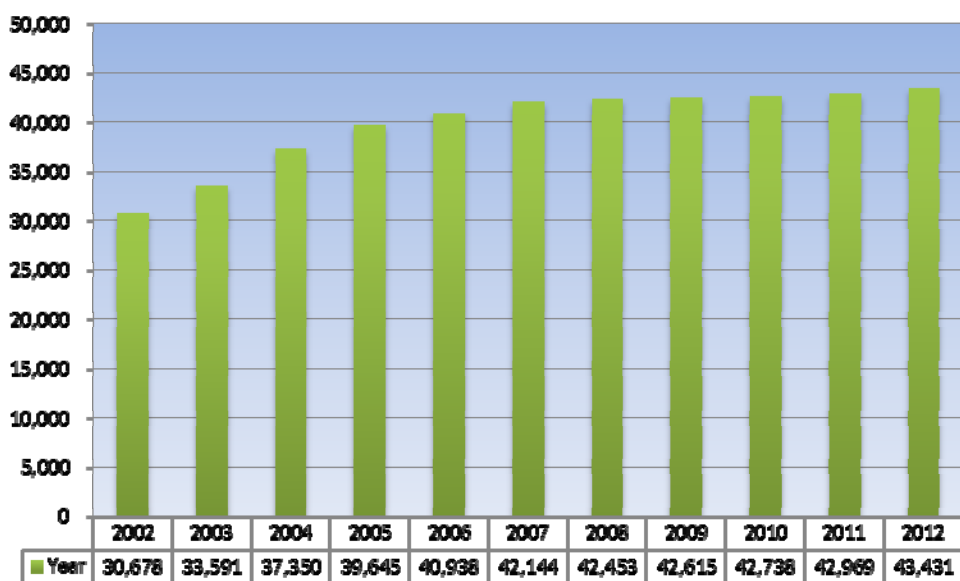

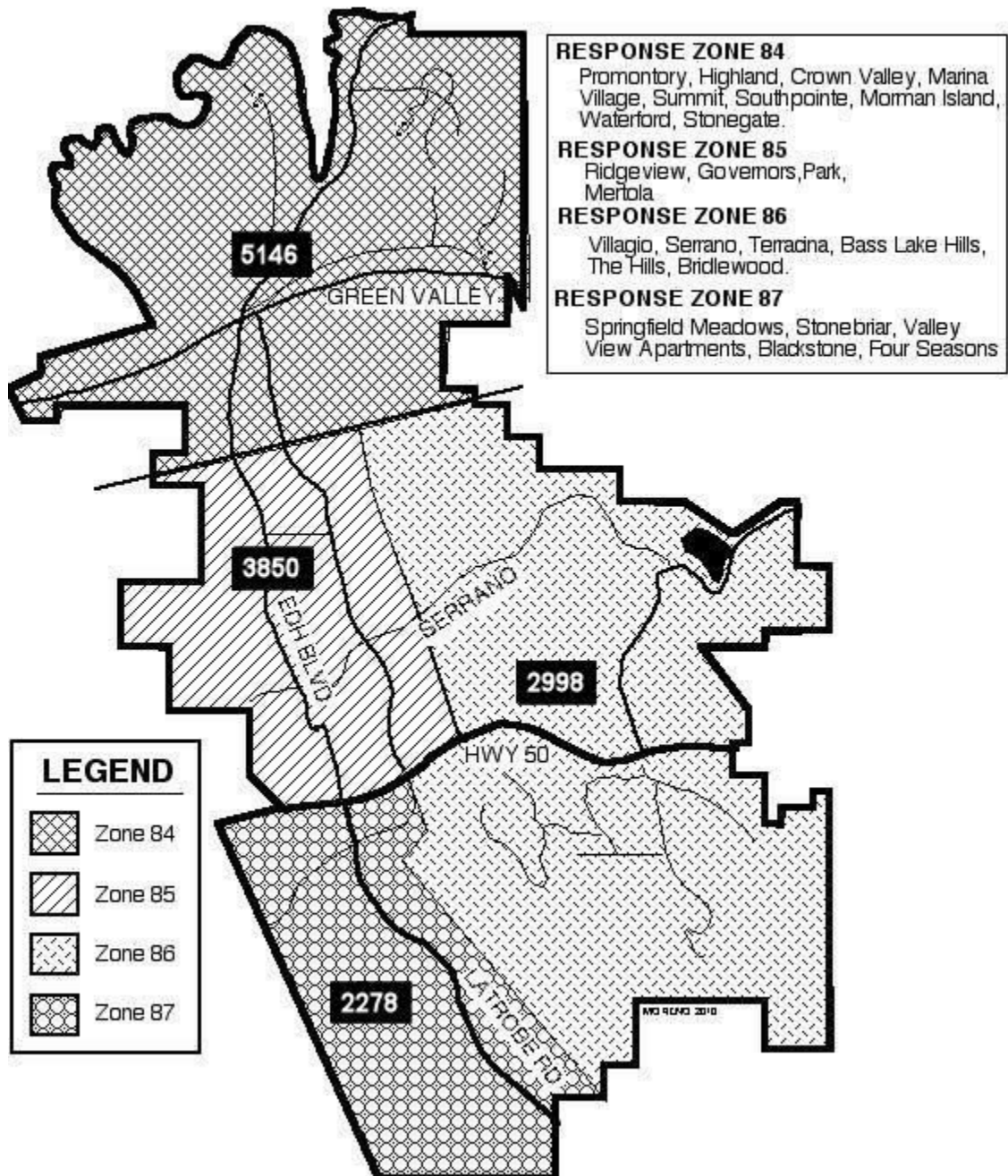
Residential Growth (housing units)



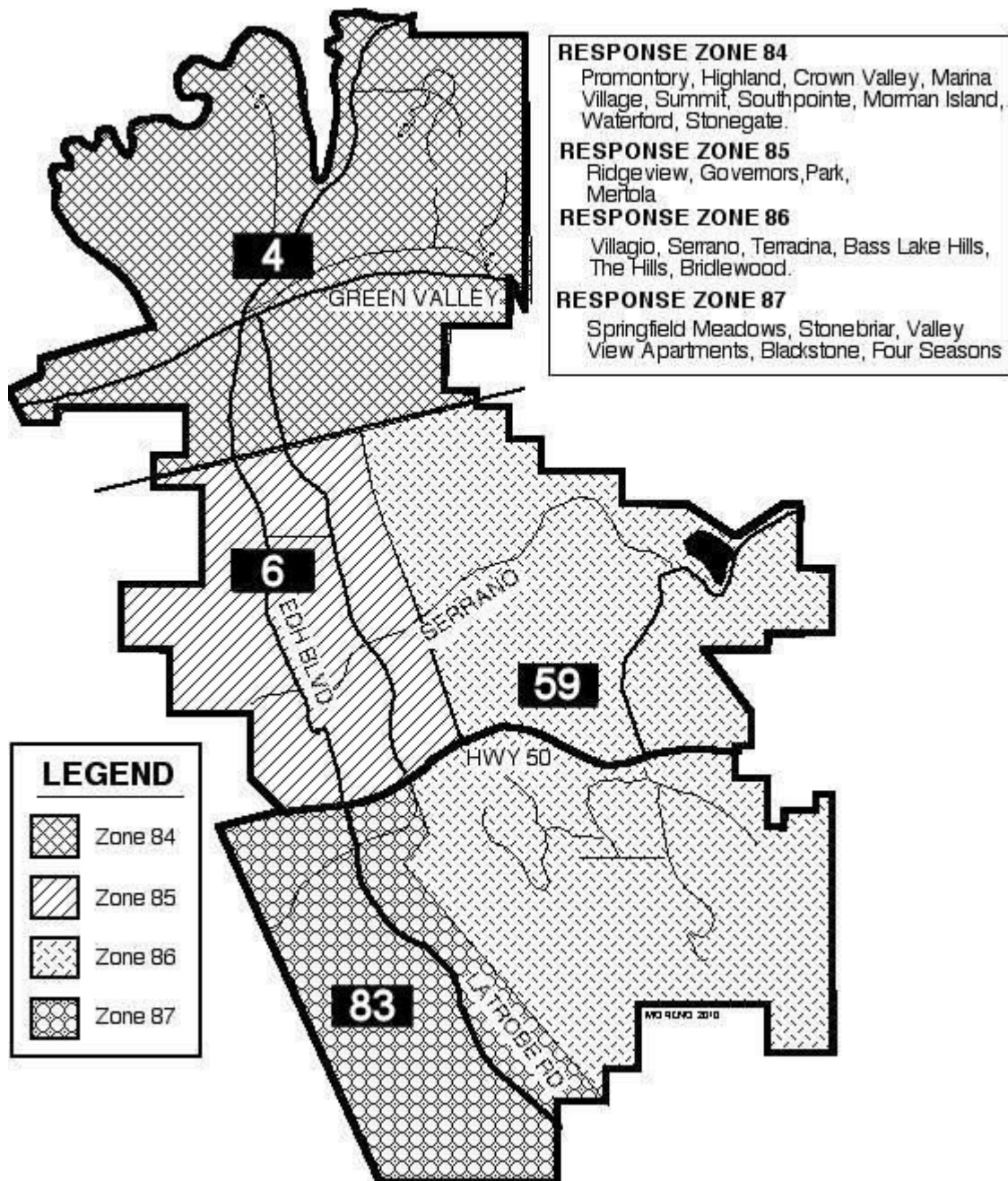

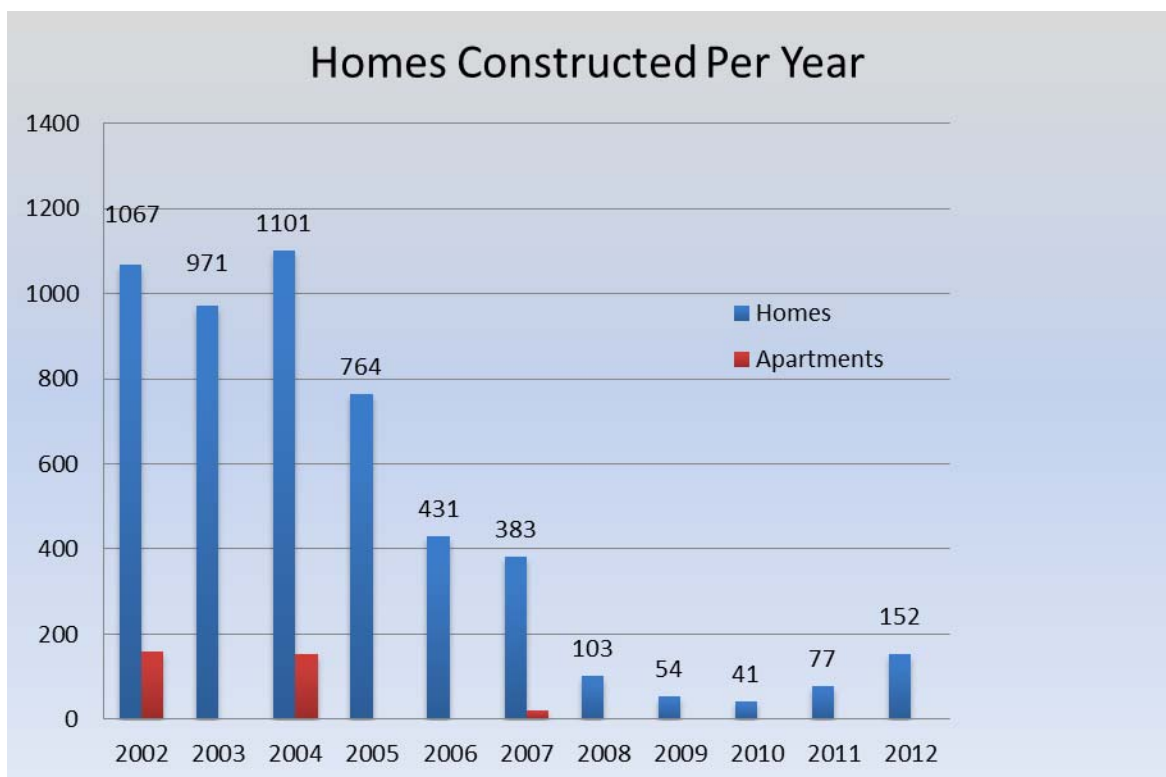
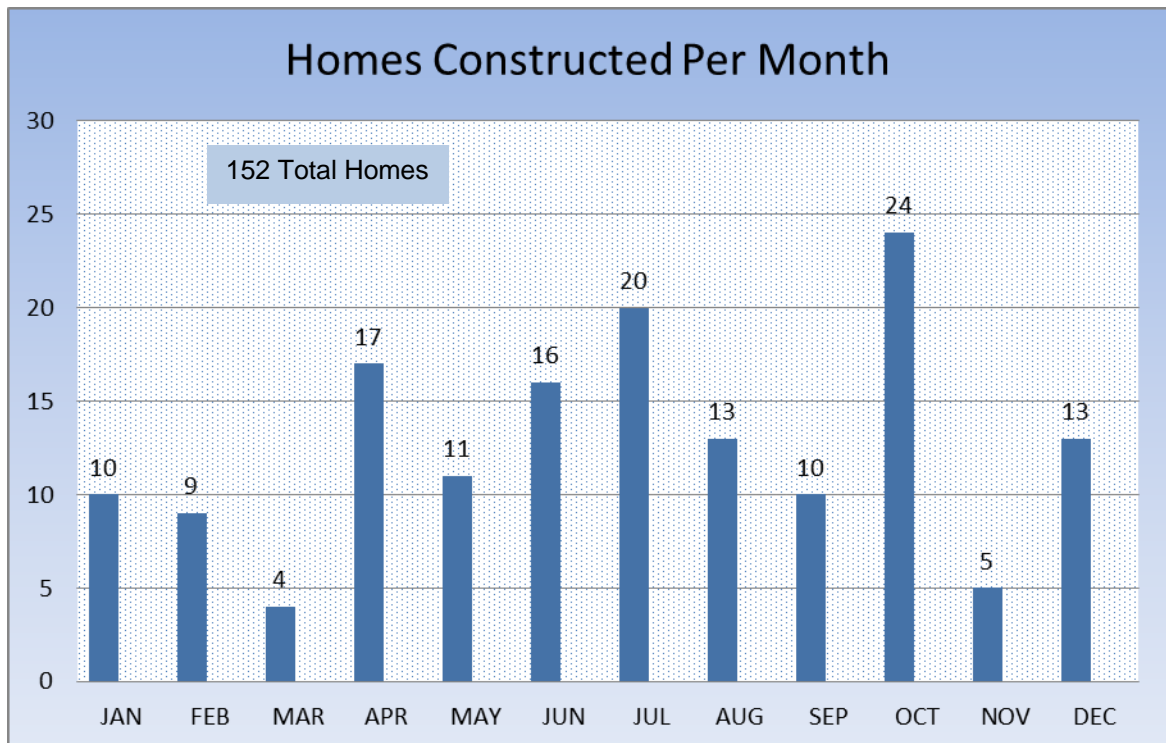


Total Homes by Response Area

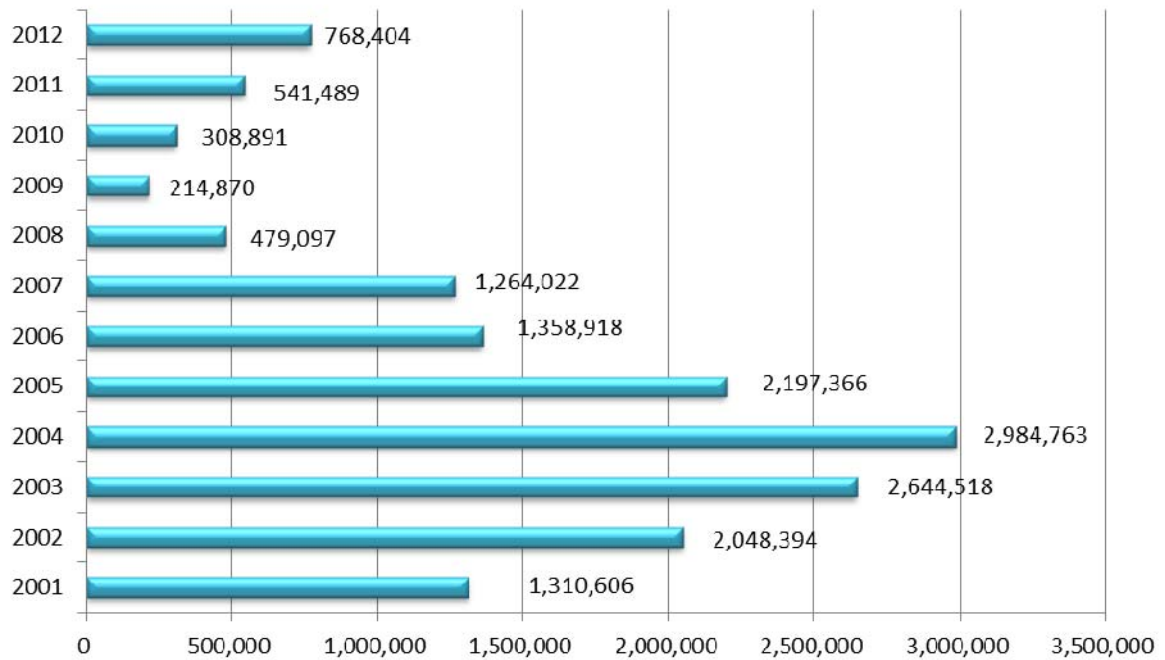


2012 Total Homes Constructed by Response Area

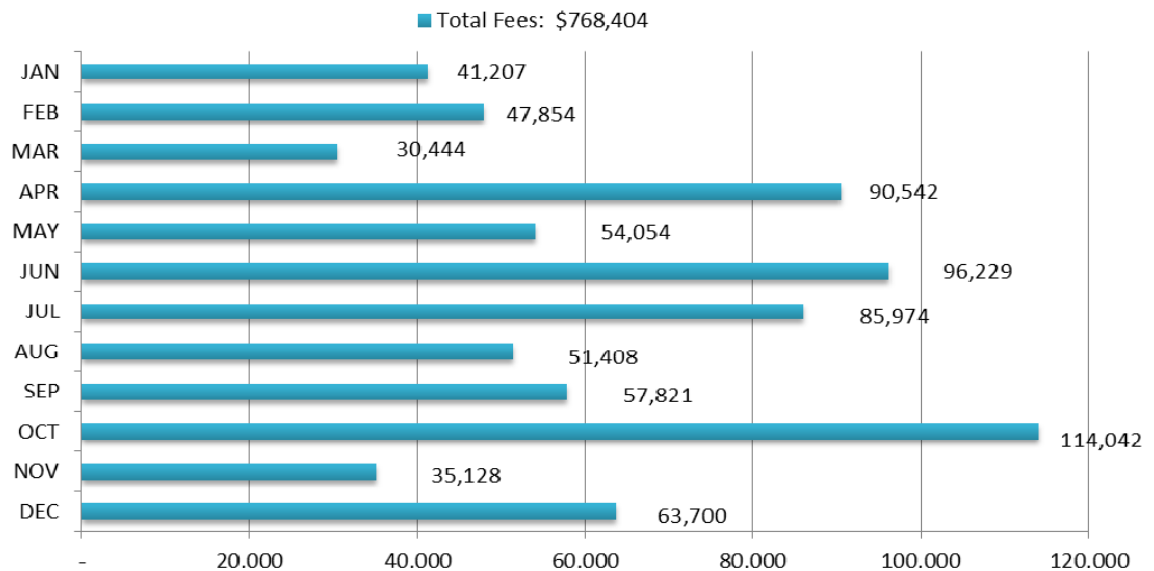


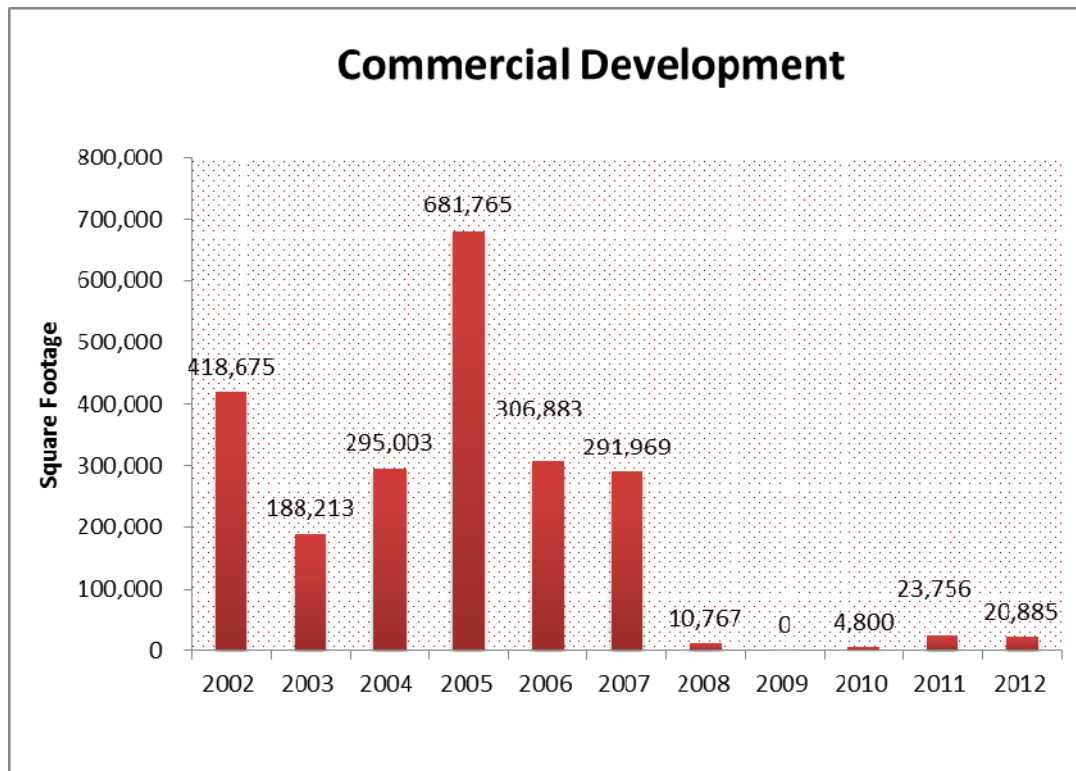
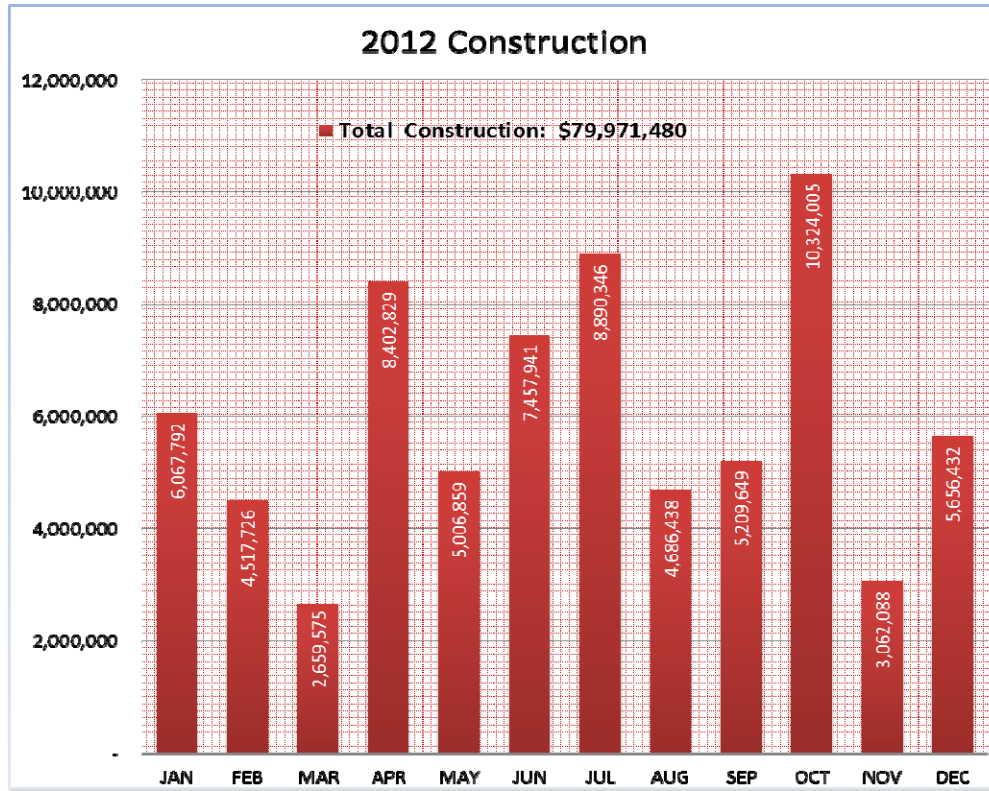


Annual Development Fees

Calls for Service



Calls for Service

The number of calls for service has remained consistent over the last three years. Despite the fact that El Dorado Hills and the State of California have experienced a very mild wildland fire season over the last few years, we continue to train like it will be the worst.

With the decrease in revenues across our region, auto and mutual aid remain a critical part of providing emergency services; it enables the closest emergency resource to be sent to those in need regardless of the fire district boundary line. The El Dorado Hills Fire Department is committed to fostering strong working relationships with our neighboring fire districts.


- General Medical Aids – remain consistent with 2011
- Wildland/Grass/Brush Fires – a slight increase over last year but down by 58% from a high four years ago
- Fires in Buildings/Structures – a slight increase from last year with no significant trends
- The Status Systems Management Model that the El Dorado County JPA adopted has kept the El Dorado Hills Medic Unit 85 in District so that 90% of the emergency calls in our urban area can be responded to within 11 minutes or less.
- Electronic mapping and mobile computer interface with our dispatch center have simplified responses to emergency calls making for a quicker response time.

Significant improvements to the Volunteer Firefighters Program have made our organization stronger and more flexible. To help augment the current three-person staffing on all fire engines, an apprentice Firefighter from the volunteer ranks gives the community a fourth person on two of the engine companies approximately 25% of the time.

The El Dorado Hills Fire Department strives to meet and exceed the needs of the community despite the decreased tax revenue. We will continue to provide exceptional customer service with integrity and excellence to the community of El Dorado Hills.

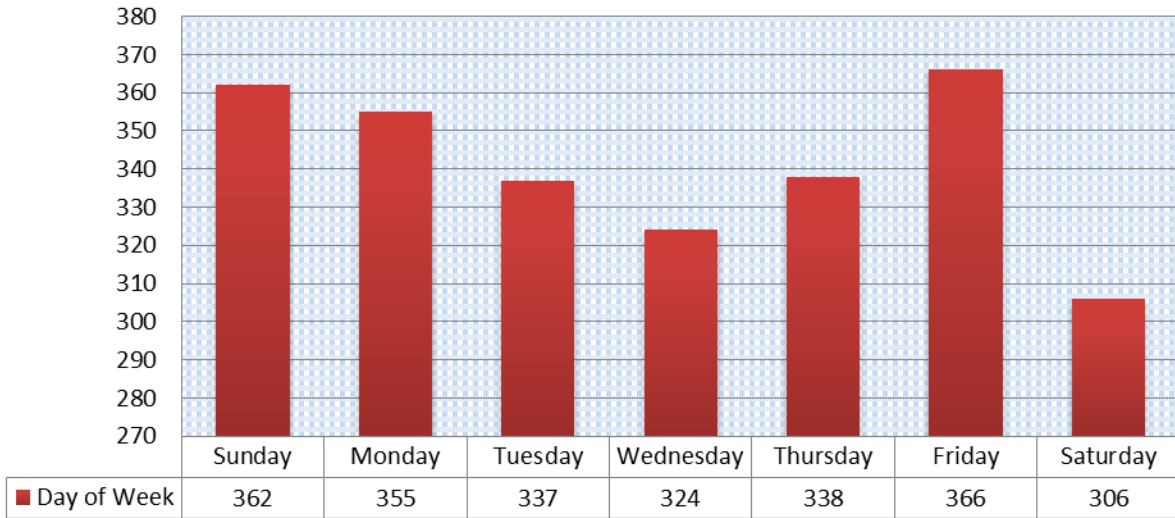
Alarms per Month



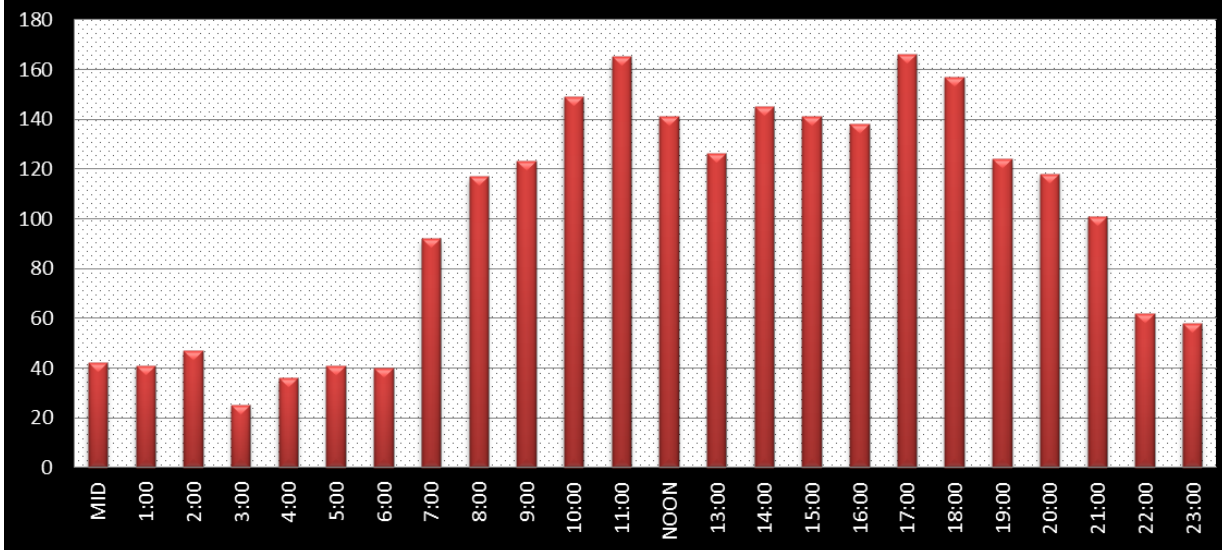
Alarms Per Year



Alarms Per Day



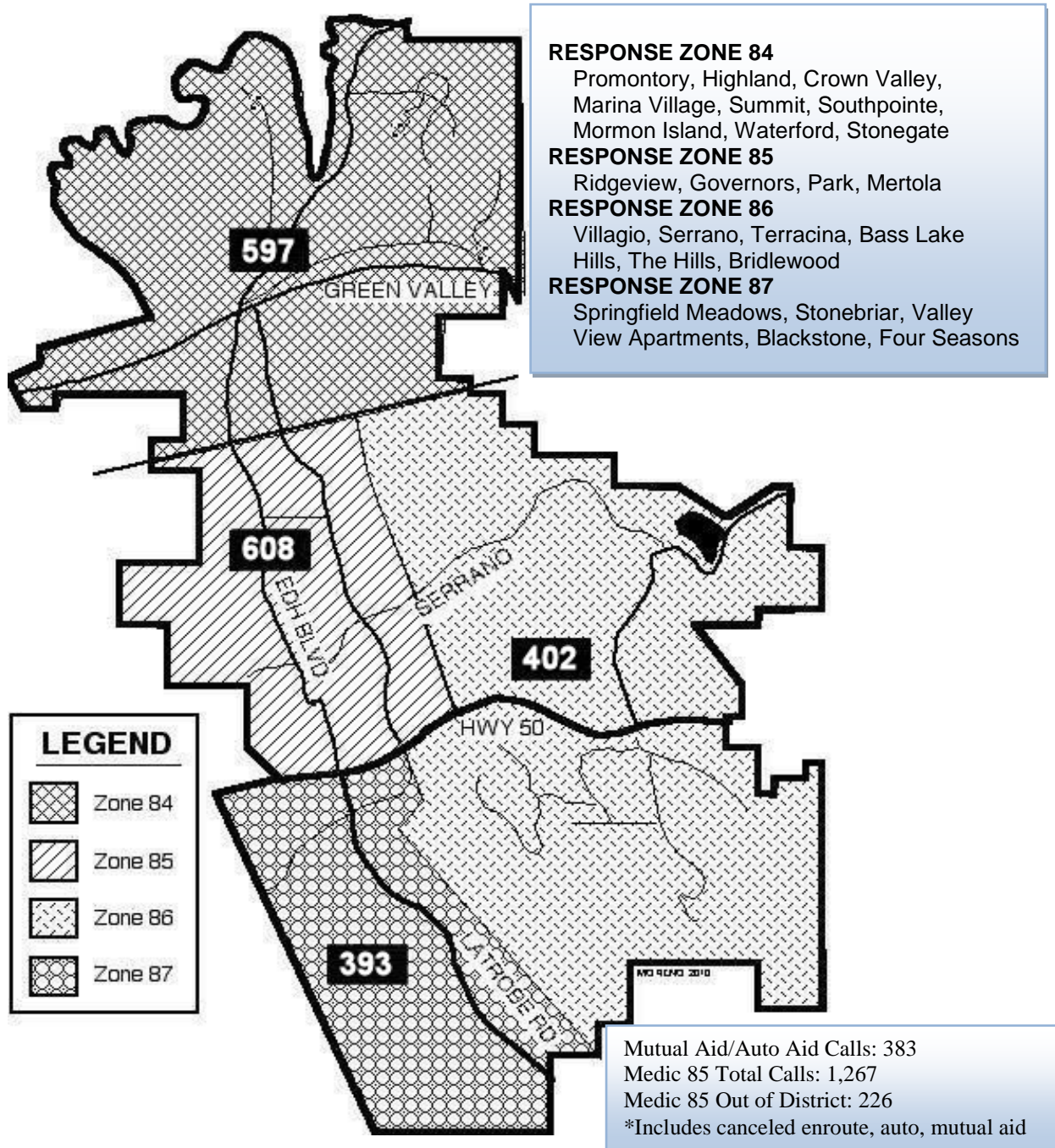
Responses by Time of Day




TRAINING AND EMERGENCY SERVICES

The Training Division's mission is to ensure that El Dorado Hills Fire Department personnel provide the highest level of emergency and non-emergency services to the community and return home safely at the end of each shift. This mission aligns with our Department mission statement: "We, the El Dorado Hills Fire Department, exist to serve and protect the Community through emergency management."

Maintaining a high skill level of Department personnel is accomplished through in-house training that conveys new concepts and techniques, reinforces existing skills and addresses modern advances in the delivery of emergency services. Specialized training programs cover such diverse topics as Wildland Urban Interface Firefighting, Low Angle Rope Rescue, Auto Extrication, Hazardous Materials Operations, and Flood and Swift Water Rescues. The basics to maintain a high level of proficiency in emergency services include continual education in paramedicine and performance standards for all tools and equipment available to fire personnel.

In 2012, the El Dorado Hills Fire Department conducted a multi-agency, multi-county wildland fire exercise in the Lakehills area. The exercise was developed and coordinated by El Dorado Hills personnel with assistance from multiple county agencies. The drill emulated a wildland fire scenario in a high risk area to test, train, educate and prepare members of our Department, mutual aid partners and residents of our community. The result was an unprecedented learning experience that will ultimately be used to lay the foundation for a formal El Dorado Hills Disaster Plan benefitting the entire community.

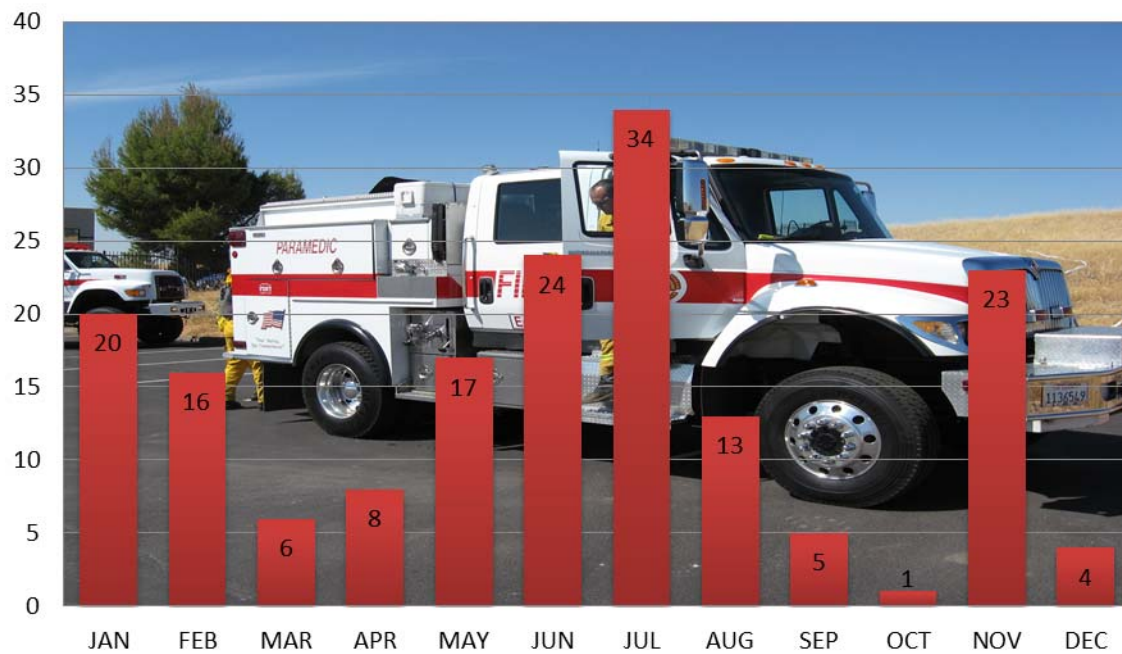

FIRE PREVENTION

The Fire Prevention Bureau has experienced a great deal of change this year both in personnel and in the volume of activity. A major milestone occurred on December 28, 2012, when Fire Marshal Brad Ballenger officially retired. Brad served the citizens of El Dorado Hills for 25 years. He was a wealth of knowledge and will be missed.

New Fire Marshal Michael Lilienthal joined the El Dorado Hills Fire Department on September 4, 2012, after having served 16 years with the City of Stockton Fire Department. Chief Lilienthal shadowed Chief Ballenger for three months prior to assuming responsibility for the Fire Prevention Division.

The Fire Prevention Bureau has seen a steady increase in applications for building permits, new building construction and new home construction. Applications for building permits totaled 148 production homes, 26 custom homes and 42 remodels for a total of 730,824 new square feet. Actual residential homes completed were 152.

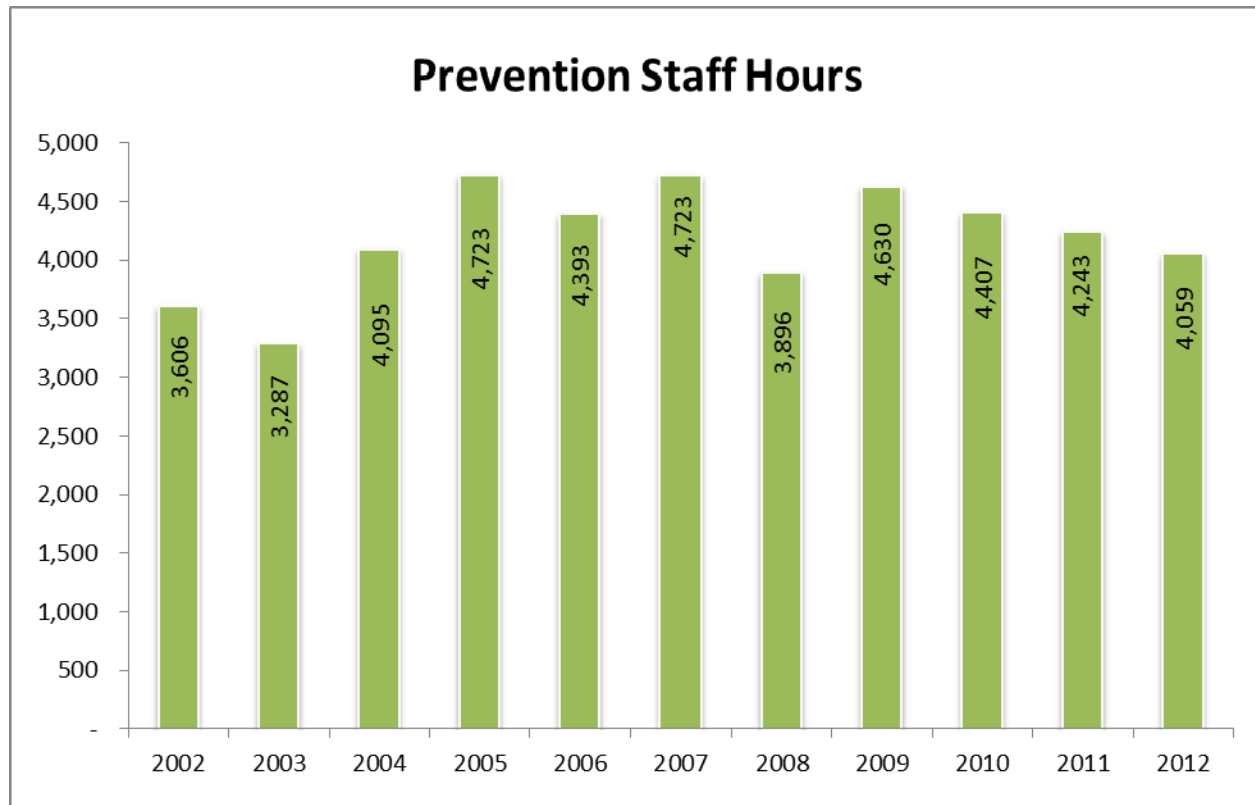
Another major success in 2012 was the formation of the Lakehills Fire Safe Council. In June, the Department hosted a Multi-Agency Disaster Exercise (M.A.D.E.) in the Lakehills area bordering Folsom Lake. Firefighters across El Dorado County participated in a simulated firestorm event. Lakehills was identified as a major danger due to heavy vegetation overgrowth. As a result of the event, the citizens in the Lakehills Community teamed up and formed the Lakehills Fire Safe Council. They have successfully organized the residents and through various community programs, worked to abate a significant amount of the overgrowth in the area.

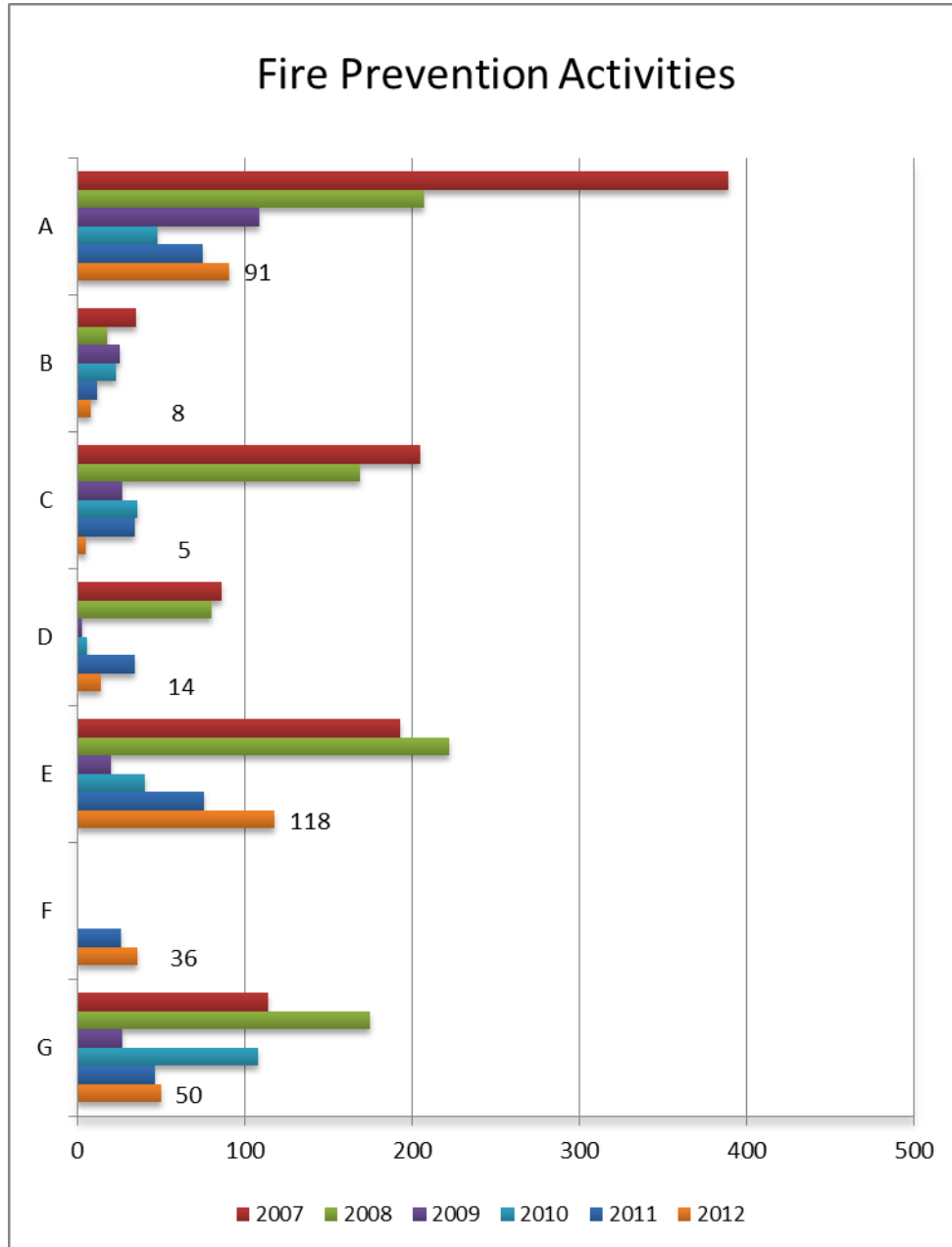
